REQUEST: **Discussion and Possible Action:** To recommend to the Board of Supervisors a letter be sent to the Bureau of Land Management conveying concerns related to management and stewardship of the Prison Hill Recreation Area and Silver Saddle Ranch.

GENERAL DISCUSSION:

This item has been placed on the agenda at the request of Robyn Orloff with the concurrence of the Parks & Recreation Director and Chairman Bruce Scott. Robyn is a resident in the southeast area of Carson City who hikes and enjoys the southwest area of Prison Hill. Through a series of e-mails, some attached for the Committee's use (Exhibit A), Robyn has explained to staff that there is a need for better stewardship of Prison Hill. Some of the information has also been forwarded to the Bureau of Land Management (BLM). On March 25, 2014, Mr. Leon Thomas, Field Manager for the BLM Sierra Front Field Office, assigned a team to address the damage to the fence used to separate the motorized and non-motorized areas. Robyn has requested additional work consisting of better identification of the motorized and non-motorized areas with signs, rocks (boulders) and/or markers. She suggested the placement of markers along the entire boundary from the rocks to the summit and possibly additional maps. Besides these specific requests, Robyn has raised questions as to the Conservation Easement and how can Carson City be responsible for items and resources that have not been appropriately managed prior to the land transfer from BLM to the City.

Staff anticipates a robust discussion of these items at the Open Space Advisory Committee meeting. Staff is of the opinion that given the advisory capacity of the Committee to the Board of Supervisors, the best course of action is to transmit the concerns discussed to the Board in the form of a letter to the BLM. Please refer to the draft letter, Exhibit B.

Similarly, the deterioration of the Silver Saddle Ranch facilities has been noted by staff. For example, vegetation is overgrown on trails and the facility's overall appearance has deteriorated. Staff is concerned about the improvements and the future cost to the City if they are not properly maintained.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: I move to recommend to the Board of Supervisors a letter be sent to the Bureau of Land Management conveying concerns related to management and stewardship of the Prison Hill Recreation Area and Silver Saddle Ranch.

Hi Juan,
Thank you for your call the other day!

I was surprised to hear that the Prison Hill Motorized Area allows rock crawling, and off trail/road cross country/canyon travel! Was that allowed when the property was owned by the BLM? -- and carried through when the property transferred to Carson City? Is there any restriction, if the canyon has intermittent water flow? (We can discuss that on our walk?).

My husband and I walked the fence line yesterday --- and are thinking that some of the downed areas might be from age/natural causes (and others are definitely rammed).

We noticed that the motorized area just south of the fence line, seems cleaner than it was a year ago. There is less garbage and bike/car parts - it actually looks like maybe there was a clean up effort recently in the past months. Perhaps by the responsible sector of the Motorized Group?

My husband's idea (he is a motorized user!):
What would you think about putting garbage cans at the staging area off Golden Eagle? and maybe at the Water tower parking area at the end of Koontz (for motorized folks and hikers) --- and maybe at the top of South Prison Hill where the (motorized) road levels out at the granite outcroppings (above the fence line). I will take you up there (or maybe you know where I am talking about - we call it "Graffiti Rock" because there is quite a bit of Graffiti on it). All those areas often sport quite a bit of beer cans/bottles and fast food wrappings etc. I try to bring bags when I am out for my hikes/runs, and pick up what I can along the way (and definitely where I park). We also do some graffiti eradication when we can, and I have spoken with Don Quilici about it as well - a year or so ago - (and donated paint!).

And, what do you think about putting in a porta-potty (like the one at Morgan Mills and Silver Saddle?) at the staging area and maybe even at the parking area by the Water Tower (for the motorized and hikers)?

I know, I am demanding : > (((and I do understand that budget constraints might limit these resources. I do think the trash cans behind the college (off Murphy/Freedom, near the Observatory) and at Foothill entrance to the Ash Canyon/Timberline Creek area, really help!



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Prison Hill Recreation Area

A High Point for Carson City!



Visible throughout Carson City, the approximately 2,450 acre Prison Hill Recreation Area has been set aside and dedicated as open space for the community of Carson City. This popular open space is available for those who wish to hike, mountain bike, horseback ride, ride off-highway vehicles (south end only), experience great views of the Carson Range and Pine Nut Mountains, enjoy the quiet and take some great pictures. Prison Hill is located on the southeast side of town and has three main community parking areas.



Hiker gates provide easy access on the west side of the Prison Hill Recreation Area in Carson City.

The **northern end**, located off of Fairview Drive, East Fifth Street and Carson River Road, has short loop trails open to foot, bicycle and equestrian use and is closed to motorized vehicles. These trails were established cooperatively by the Bureau of Land Management, State of Nevada, and the Carson City School District to provide for cross country running trails.

Are Prison Hill and Silver Saddle Ranch Going to Transfer from the BLM to Carson City?

Congress directed transfer of Silver Saddle Ranch and federal public lands along the Carson River, including the existing Prison Hill Recreation Area (approximately 3,604 acres), subject to the reservation of a conservation easement, to Carson City under the authority of the Omnibus Public Lands Management Act of 2009 (Public Law 111-11, Section 2601).

The main community parking area and trailhead is located at the east end of Koontz Lane. Trails either connect to other access points or rise in elevation to a loop trail at the top of Prison Hill. This provides excellent views of the Sierra, Eagle Valley and the Carson River, the Pine Nut Range to the south, and an expansive overview of Carson City.

BLM, acting through the Secretary of the Interior and in consultation with Carson City and affected local interests, has reserved a perpetual conservation easement to protect, preserve and enhance the conservation values of the property, and to see that Carson City protects the Carson River, floodplain and surrounding uplands and wildlife habitat. The conservation easement was signed on December 22, 2010.

The **southern end** of Prison Hill provides trails for motorized use. A small OHV loop system is adjacent to the staging area, and travel routes are available on sandy trails and washes. Please check map for "Motorized Use" boundary.

Development of the conservation easement was guided by the results of a planning and design charette completed in December 2008, entitled *Creating a Community Vision: Silver Saddle Ranch and the Carson River*.

Portions of the central part of Prison Hill have become popular for technical rock climbing. Local enthusiasts know a number of technical routes up a variety of crags and pitches. A good description of the resource is found in pages 46-55 of the now out-of print 1991 Climbers Guide East Tahoe Region by Ron Anderson.

Though the actual transfer of these lands is not anticipated until sometime in 2011, when the transfer does occur Carson City may use the property for undeveloped open space, passive recreation, customary agricultural practices and wildlife protection. Carson City may construct and maintain trails and trailhead facilities, conduct fuels reduction projects, maintain or reconstruct any improvements on the property that were in existence on March 31, 2009, and allow the use of motorized vehicles on designated roads, trails and areas in the south end of Prison Hill.

Treat our natural heritage with respect. Leave plants, rocks and historical artifacts as you find them. Deposit human waste in catholes dug 6 to 8 inches deep at least 200 feet from trails. Cover and disguise hole. Pack everything that you bring in on your excursion out! Stay on designated trails; do not shortcut switchbacks. Learn about the regulations and issues that apply to the area you're visiting.

BLM and Carson City have mutually agreed that the conservation values also include protection of natural resources, preservation of the property for solitude and nature observation, maintaining the green irrigated pastures and hay fields of Silver Saddle Ranch, protecting scenic resources including the preservation of dark skies, protecting cultural resources including the historic structures at Silver Saddle Ranch, promoting environmental education and interpretation, allowing public access, promoting the quality of life, and safety and tourism.

- * Pack out trash! As a regular visitor, consider picking up some litter as a community service!
- * Please, no campfires.
- * Stay on established trails. Creating new trails on steep hillsides results in erosion during rainstorms.
- * Dogs love the open space, but must be kept under verbal control or on a leash by their owners.
- * Shooting is prohibited in the Recreation Area.

Whatever means of travel you choose to explore Prison Hill, be aware of wildlife inhabiting the area. This includes coyotes, rabbits, hawks, ground squirrels, and deer. You may even see golden eagles around the rock outcrops in the upper elevations.

Vegetation throughout the area is representative of "Big Sage" zone plants. This consists of Big Sagebrush, Desert Peach, Bitter brush, Ephedra, Indian Ricegrass, and occasional Juniper and Pinyon trees. A wonderful aroma surrounds the hills during the spring when the brush is in bloom. Since vegetation is predominantly brush, the exposed slopes can endure hot summer temperatures. Always remember to bring water, hat, sunglasses, and sunscreen as you explore.

The geologic make-up of Prison Hill consists of two different rock types. Jurassic aged metamorphosed volcanic rock is exposed at the northern end, and a Cretaceous, medium-grained granitic rock exists at the southern end of the hill. In the northern end, as the larger rock mass disintegrates, pieces of broken outcrop appear that are dark-colored and consist of an andesite mud-flow breccia. Both rock types seem to be popular among local rock climbers and add interesting visual features to the hillsides.

Robyn in responding I will follow the order of your questions:

1-You make good points we anticipate using a combination of features to mark the boundaries. As the Open Space Manger for Carson City I will advocate for a more specific study or management plan specifically for Prison Hill to determine what improvements should we make and what priorities should we follow. We applied for a grant from the OHV Commission a month back to fund this type of study and we have not herd as yet if they are going to fund us. At the present time and if we were to place trash cans at areas of Prison Hill, we would not have the man power to pick up the trash from trash cans. We will consider a manner to accomplish maintaining and servicing trash cans such as thru a private contractor.

2-Good for BLM and us. I am not familiar with BLM shooting regulations.

3-Yes BLM and Carson City do manage Ambrose for example cooperatively. BLM has staff to maintain the bathrooms, trash cans, buildings and corrals at SSR.

4- I truly do not know for certain why SSR has better maintenance that Prison Hill. There are more facilities at SSR and it was the subject of a collaborative planning process. Probably thru time it was felt that as a remote motorized site Prison Hill had an adequate level of maintenance and improvements, you are making the case for better stewardship at Prison Hill.

5-Thanks to you for adopting Prison Hill and for your effort in conveying to us and BLM Staff the uniqueness of Prison Hill. Please continue to communicate your ideas to BLM the present manger of these lands and to us.

Re: Management of Prison Hill and Silver Saddle Ranch

Dear Mr. Thomas:

The Carson City Board of Supervisors and the Open Space Advisory Committee have received communications expressing concerns in reference to the deterioration of resources and lack of maintenance at Silver Saddle Ranch and the Prison Hill Recreation Area. At Silver Saddle Ranch, some trails are overgrowth by vegetation, the lawn at the red house has all but disappeared, and the impact of the wear and tear continues. At Prison Hill, the fence separating parking and motorized use areas from the non-motorized use areas has been broken and with particular concern near the summit, signage has been vandalized, and physical barriers removed.

These problems are a few of the concerns in light of the pending transfer of these lands to Carson City as authorized by the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009 and the executed conservation easement. The legislation and easement required trust and very hard work from Bureau of Land Management staff, our staff, and residents, which resulted in a great accomplishment. We ask you to facilitate the continuation of a great relationship in order to complete the transfer of lands.
