**1. CALL TO ORDER, ROLL CALL, AND DETERMINATION OF QUORUM.**

(5:36:10) – Chairperson McBride called the meeting to order at 5:36 p.m. Roll was called and a quorum was present.

**2. PUBLIC COMMENTS AND DISCUSSION**

(5:36:34) – Chairperson McBride entertained public comments. Jason Justice introduced himself and wished to see the Capital Collage event supported by the Commission at future Nevada Day events. Gina Hill, Executive Director of the Brewery Arts Center, reported on a “successful and incident-free” 10-week Levitt Amp concert series featuring 18,000 attendees. She also announced the airing of the concert series on Arteffects on the KNBP public television channel on September 21, 2018. Commissioner Abowd suggested better coordination with Advocates Against Domestic Violence and the “local fair”, as both of the events also featured music. Ms. Hill explained that the grant obligated them to 10 consecutive week concerts. She also clarified for Commissioner Ramirez that the events had been promoted in Spanish. Rhonda Abend with the Carson City Classic Cinema Club introduced herself and thanked the Commission for the grant they had received for the “back to school bash that we held a couple of weeks ago”, adding that the event was a “huge success for our first time out” with 270 student attendees. Milo McCormick introduced himself as a “19-year old college student at Western Nevada College and a prospective applicant for the Cultural Commission”. Mr. McCormick praised the Commission’s activities and noted that he had performed at some of the musical events.

#### 5. FOR DISCUSSION ONLY ITEMS

##### 5.a FOR DISCUSSION ONLY: CAPITAL CITY ARTS INITIATIVE PRESENTS TWO ARTISTS FROM ITS CURRENT EXHIBITION THE WIND CALLS.

(5:45:30) – Chairperson McBride introduced the item. Capital City Arts Initiative (CCAI) Executive Director Sharon Rosse introduced several exhibitions in town. She noted that the exhibit in the Community Development Building featured nine artists from the University of Nevada Reno (UNR), two of whom were present in the room. Frances Melhop and Mark Combs, masters of fine arts (MFA) students, introduced themselves and thanked the Commission and CCAI for their support. Ms. Rosse also distributed flyers of upcoming events such as the Visual Oasis exhibit at the Courthouse and the upcoming Nevada Neighbors talk at 6 p.m. on September 19, 2018 at a coffee shop on Curry and West Proctor Streets. She also responded to clarifying questions by the Commissioners.

**5.b FOR DISCUSSION ONLY: THE STATE OF NEVADA OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL PRESENTS AN UPCOMING CARSON CITY EXHIBITION.**

(5:54:06) – Chairperson McBride introduced the item. Patty Cafferata introduced herself as the Special Assistant Attorney General for Law Enforcement Counties and Municipalities and Ann Goldy, Legal Assistant in the Attorney General’s Office. Ms. Goldy gave background and described the upcoming exhibit displaying photographs and biographies of former Nevada attorney generals in the reception area and posting them on the Nevada Attorney General’s website. She also described the challenge of finding old photographs and biographies. Mr. Salinas noted that the project had received a Nevada Humanities grant and believed this “expanded the footprints of our art walk”.

**5.C FOR DISCUSSION ONLY: THE STATE OF NEVADA INDIAN COMMISSION PRESENTS AN UPDATE ON THE STEWART INDIAN SCHOOL MASTER PLAN.**

This presentation was tabled.

**6. FOR DISCUSSION:****a. ARTS & CULTURE COORDINATOR REPORT**

(6:01:44) – Mr. Salinas introduced two newly-appointed members on the Carson City Culture and Tourism Authority Board, Mike Jones and Mike Santos; Jason Justice, Vice Chair of the Carson City Redevelopment Authority Citizens Committee; and Dr. Vincent Solis, President of Western Nevada College. He also presented his report along with accompanying photographs, incorporated into the record, and highlighted the July 7, 2018 event at the Bliss Mansion, celebrating the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Cultural Commission. He also responded to clarifying questions by the commissioners.

**c. COMMISSIONER REPORTS / COMMENTS**

(6:158:29) – Commissioner Abowd announced that the downtown flower baskets will be removed at the end of September, and encouraged donations and sponsorships for the 2019 baskets. She also reported on the plans for the upcoming Celebrity Chef Harvest Dinner, a Greenhouse Project fundraiser, to take place on November 12, 2018.

(6:19:55) – Commissioner Bugli gave a “near final report of the Jazz and Beyond Festival”, noting that it had been extended because of the Jukebox International Film Festival. She stated that some bills had not been received yet but she believed “we’ll finish in the black”, and offered to return with “final numbers” at the next meeting. Commissioner Bugli also announced an upcoming event at Comma Coffee with the Mile High Jazz Band, and responded to clarifying questions.

(6:24:42) – Commissioner Ramirez announced El Día De Los Muertos celebrations at Western Nevada College on November 1, 2018, and invited the public to the collaborative event with/at the Nevada State Museum on November 2 and 3, 2018.

**c. FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS**

(6:25:24) – Commissioner Abowd noted that she had sent Mr. Salinas images of art pieces from the Burning Man event and requested that he check what is available at this time.

**d. UPCOMING MEETINGS AND EVENTS**

(6:26:18) – Mr. Salinas announced that he would attend a leadership retreat on Thursday, September 13, 2018. He also noted that the application submission period had ended for the two vacant positions on the Commission and that the Board of Supervisors would be conducting interviews on October 4, 2018, adding that five applications had been received some of whom were in the 18 through 25-year-old category. Mr. Salinas announced several upcoming area art and culture events as well.

(6:30:18) – Mr. Salinas announced that the Commission's next meeting will take place on November 26, 2018 because the original date coincided with the Veterans' Day holiday. He also explained to Vice Chair D'Anneo that the new commissioner appointment will follow the existing City processes. Discussion ensued regarding appointments from the art community entities as well and Mr. Salinas gave background and clarified past appointments.

**7. PUBLIC COMMENTS AND DISCUSSION (THREE MINUTE TIME LIMIT)**

(6:37:40) – Chairperson McBride announced the November meeting date change one more time and entertained public comments. Ms. Rosse noted that an elections forum will be held by the League of Women Voters on October 8, 9, 15 and 16, 2018 at the Brewery Arts Center and that the CCAI had submitted two questions. CTA Chair Mike Jones introduced himself and announced the hiring of a new marketing manager for the Authority. CTA Member Mike Santos thanked Mr. Salinas for a presentation on the City's arts and culture activities and looked forward to working with him. Dr. Solis also thanked the commissioners and stress the importance of "real world learning" in addition to classroom learning "to provide the best graduates that we can".

**8. FOR POSSIBLE ACTION: TO ADJOURN.**

(6:44:52) – Chairperson McBride entertained a motion to adjourn. A motion was made by Commissioner Abowd. The meeting was adjourned at 6:45 p.m.


Jazlyn Duran, a senior at CHS, sorts through original oil and acrylic paintings by former Carson artist Carol Benson at the Carson City Senior Center.

For her project, Duran will log her hours working with Salinas and write a paper on how the project helps her learn more about art as a potential career choice and how the project impacted her on a personal level.







El Día de los Muertos, or Day of the Dead, is a traditional celebration originated from Mexico. The meaning of this event is to remember and honor our deceased ancestors. People celebrate in a variety of ways throughout the country. In small towns, most families create altars (ofrendas) in their homes to welcome the souls of their departed loved ones. The altars are decorated with pictures, candles, buckets of flowers, sugar skulls, pan de muerto (Mexican Bread of the Dead), among many other things. Additionally, they place the favorite foods of the deceased loved one in front of their picture.

Families also visit their loved ones at the cemetery. They bring them their favorite food and drink. It is also very common that families hire a mariachi band and serenade their deceased loved ones at the cemetery. They conclude the day by praying a rosary.

We are super excited about the partnership between Western Nevada College and the Nevada State Museum to bring this celebration to the entire community. We will have entertainment for everyone. Some of the activities will be entertainment from the folkloric dancers, arts and crafts for the children, face painting, sugar skulls, and much more!



NONPROFIT ARTS ORGANIZATIONS (ESTIMATED)




