

The State of Nevada Model – implemented at CCSD, reviewed by Emergency Manager, Sheriff's Dept. and Health & Human Services



- Standardized organizational structures, processes and procedures
- Standards for planning, training and exercising
- Personnel qualification standards
- Equipment acquisition and certification standards
- Interoperable communications processes, procedures and systems
- Information management systems with a commonly accepted architecture
- Supporting technologies – voice and data communications systems, information systems, data display systems, specialized technologies
- Publication management processes and activities.

- Incident Command System
- The Incident Command System is a standardized approach to the command, control, and coordination of emergency response providing a common hierarchy within which responders from multiple agencies can be effective.

Partnerships

- Carson City Emergency Management, Fire Department and Sheriff's Department meet regularly with CCSD staff to ensure preparedness and readiness

Emergency Training

There are different types of exercises that can be used to evaluate plans, procedures and capabilities.

- Walkthroughs, workshops or orientation seminars
- Drills
- Tabletop exercises
- Functional exercises
- Full-scale exercises

DRILLS

- DRILLS are performed monthly, and typically the Fire Department and/or the SRO's are involved and participate in debriefings. Drills consist of Lockout, Lockdown, Shelter and Evacuate (Standard Response Protocol).
- Special event drills are coordinated with community partners including the Capitol Police (Tree Lighting Festival)

Walkthroughs, workshops or orientation seminars

- Walkthroughs are conducted annually by the Fire Dept. to inspect for fire & life safety code compliance.
- A workshop is held at the beginning of each school year to include all Administrators and Emergency Responders. This year training topics included the Standard Response Protocol, Parent Reunification, and bleeding control measures.
- Seminars included the NASRO conference held in Reno and attended by Mrs. Cyr & all three SRO's. From this seminar, the school district engaged a trainer who has provided training to the newly formed multi-disciplinary Threat Assessment Team.

Functional & Full Scale

- The school district is currently coordinating a functional exercise with the Sheriff's Dept. to test the Parent Reunification Plan.

Stop The Bleed

- Carson City Fire & Sheriff Deputies have provided several trainings to school district staff on emergency bleeding control measures.
- All Carson High Administrators
- All School Bus Drivers
- All Cafeteria Staff, district wide

Tabletop Exercises

- Tabletop exercises are held frequently at monthly safety meetings and have included participation from community partners.
